PDF 2 HTML5

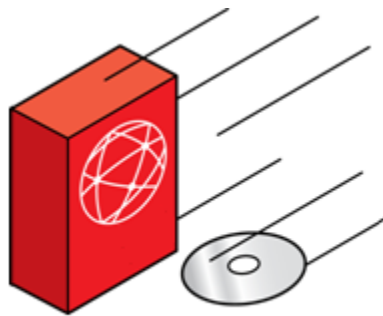
- We saw it at JavaOne 2011
- It's a secure 2 way web front end for our server processes.
- The user simply:
 - Uploads a file
 - Waits for it to process with real time updates
 - Downloads or views the result
- This is all done via a GlassFish server!
- Breath of fresh air after Tomcat
- Ideas for Phase 2 – Clustering, JavaFX, Monitoring

- It grows with you

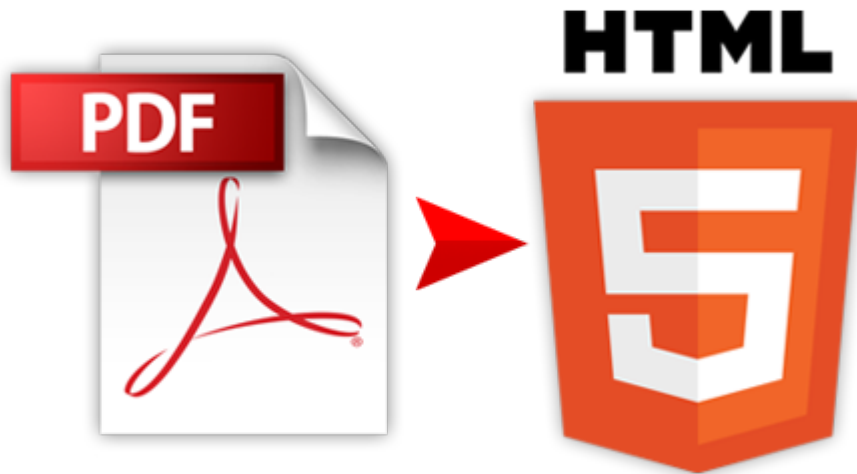


How We Think GlassFish Could Be Even Cuter

- Currently you can't update the server from the Administration Console; you can only install new add-ons.
- Problem with alternate docroot not loading images properly without a refresh in html files.
- Cross platform browser issues in some of the libraries.
 - Resin/Quercus
- PHP support is quite fiddly to set up
- No simple starter example in the Aquarium
