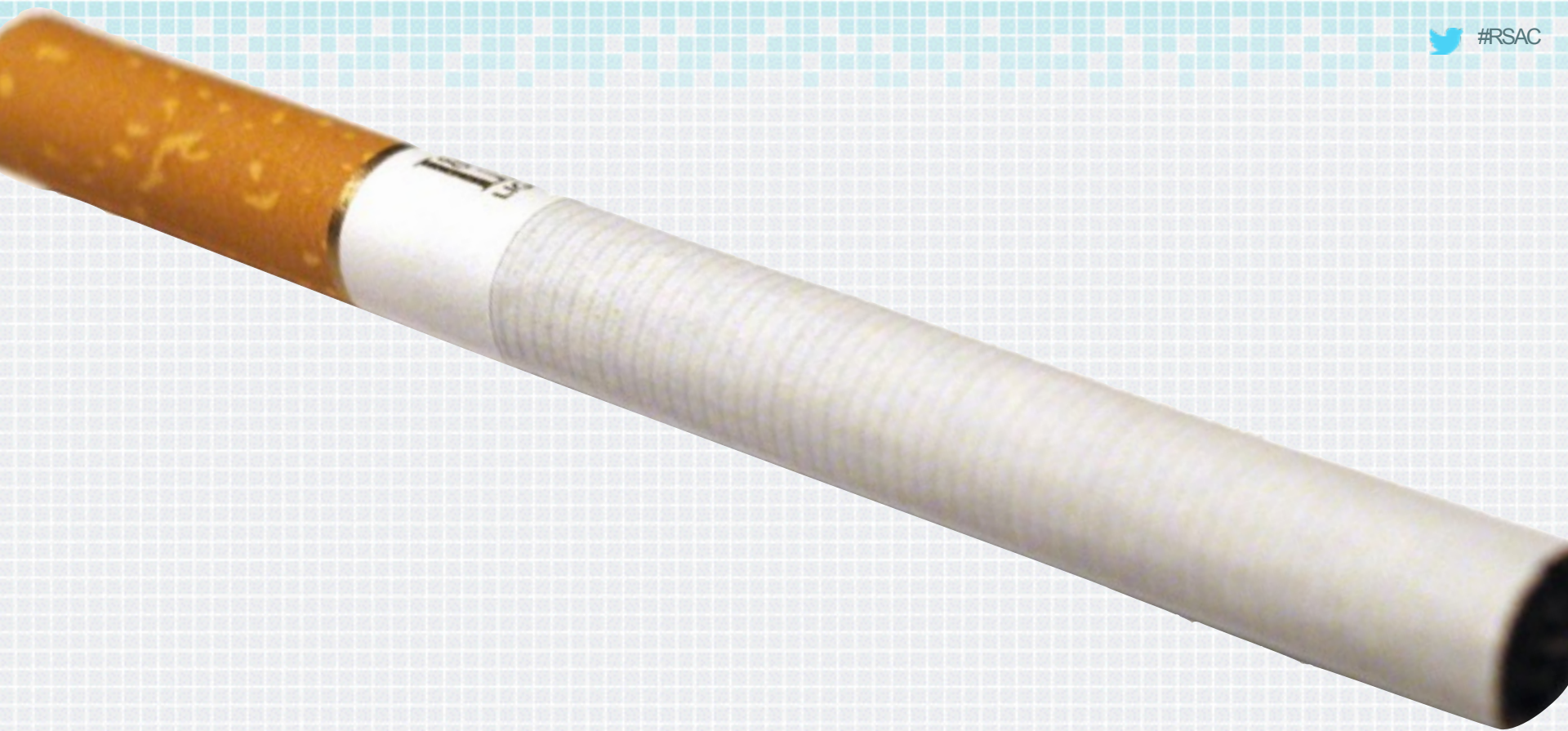

In today's online world, it's easy to be deceived by someone who appears to be trustworthy. However, to protect your details and prevent fraud, you need to be vigilant.

- Use websites that are secure (https://)
- The lock icon in the address bar
- General (browser) personal details
- Check the person's name and address
- Avoid making a purchase until you are sure the person is who they say they are
- Keep a paper trail of all transactions
- Use a credit card as a payment alternative

Many of us use internet enabled devices such as a phone, tablet or even games console; just like your computer they just as susceptible to risks inherent with online transactions. When shopping, banking, or sharing personal information online, take the same precautions as you do with your personal computer.

Password protect your device and select passwords that will be difficult for thieves to guess. If possible, use different passwords for different programs and devices.

Be aware of shoulder surfing when using your device in public and ensure no one can see you type your passwords or see any sensitive information on your screen.

Keep the Bluetooth mode in 'Off' position, cyber criminals have the capability to pair with your phone's open Bluetooth connection when you are not using it and steal personal information.

Public Wi-Fi networks, never conduct business, bank or online transactions over a public network as you never know how secure the free network is, use your cellular data service for secure transactions.

Do not lose sight of your device, unattended devices in public are easy target for thieves.

Avoid public charging stations as connecting a mobile device to an unknown source using a USB cable can allow software running on that source to gain access to your sensitive data or install new software.

Back up your data up as this will help you retrieve your data if you lose your device.

Encrypt personal or corporate files, this prevents unauthorized people from viewing data even if they can physically access it. On most devices this is automatic, but not always. Always check!

If your device is lost or stolen change the passwords of all accounts you had configured on the devices.

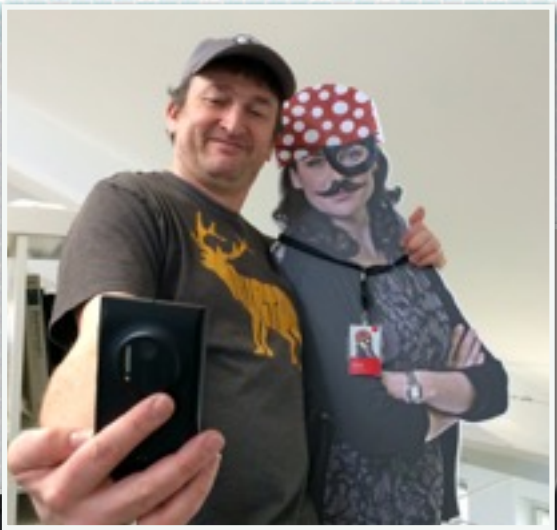

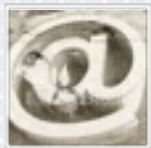
